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Smt. Sushma Swaraj's Personality and Charisma Will Continue to Inspire US

Senior BJP leader and former Foreign Minister Smt. Sushma Swaraj passed away on the night of 6th August following a sudden cardiac arrest. In her death, Indian politics has lost a leader who was not just a powerful orator but also one who was humane, sensitive and approachable as she took diplomacy to the common people. In many ways, Smt. Sushma Swaraj's political journey is the journey of a woman who broke glass ceilings, one by one, to exemplify how women too can excel in politics - an arena traditionally dominated by men.

Born in a middle-class family in Haryana, Smt. Sushma Swaraj, at the age of 25, became the youngest State Cabinet Minister in India. At 27, she became the state president of her party (Janata Party). Later in her career, she became the first woman Chief Minister of Delhi, the second woman to become the Leader of opposition in the Lok Sabha and the first full-time woman External Affairs Minister of India.

Smt. Sushma Swaraj was a well recognized face for Indian Diaspora worldwide who connected with her very fondly as she made herself easily accessible to solve their problems.

She made the Indian Foreign Ministry - otherwise seen as elitist, bureaucratic, distant and indifferent - people friendly, accessible and

responsive to the needs of the common people. Be it reuniting families, providing safe passage back home to trafficking victims or helping citizens with their passport woes requests were answered with

unprecedented promptness. Quick to respond and intervene when issues were brought to her notice, Smt. Swaraj was approached for help not only by Indians abroad but people of other nationalities as well. She had intervened on many occasions to grant visas to Pakistan nationals wanting to visit India for medical treatment earning her the title of "Mother Teresa".

ARSP had very cordial relationship with Smt. Swaraj and she was very sympathetic to our requests for strengthening the diaspora

when this re-registration was completed. I had re-entered the Transvaal in 1903 and opened my office in Johannesburg about the middle of that year. Two years had thus passed in merely resisting the inroads of the Asiatic Department. We all expected now that re-registration would satisfy the Government and confidently looked forward to a period of comparative peace for the community. But that was not to be. The reader has been already introduced to Mr. Lionel Curtis. This gentleman held, that the Europeans had not attained their objective simply because the Indian changed their old permits for new certificated of registration. It was not enough in his eyes, that great measures were achieved by mutual understanding. He was of opinion that these should have the force of law behind them, and that thus only could the principles underlying them be secured for all time. Mr. Curtis wanted some such restrictions to be placed upon Indians as would produce a striking impression all over South Africa and ultimately serve as a model for the other Dominions of the Empire to imitate. He would not consider the Transvaal to be safe so long as even a single point in South Africa was open to Indians. Again, re-registration by mutual consent was calculated to community while Mr. bearer Curtis was keen upon Corps for lowering it. The year 1906 was well under way Asiatic Bill and advised the Government that so long as his Bill was not passed, there was no provision in the laws already in force to prevent the Indians from surreptitiously entering the Transvaal or to remove unauthorized residents from the country. Mr Curtis' arguments met with a ready response from the Government, and a draft Asiatic Law Amendment Ordinance to be introduced into the Legislative Council was published in the Transvaal Government Gazette.

Before dealing with this Ordinance in detail, it would be well to dispose of an important event in a few words. As I was the author of the Satyagraha movement, it is necessary to enable the reader fully to understand some events of my life. The Zulu 'rebellion' broke out in Natal just while attempts were thus being made to impose further disabilities upon Indians in the Transvaal. I doubted then and doubt even now if the outbreak could be described as a rebellion, but it has always been thus described in Natal. Now as in the Boer War, many European residents of Natal joined the army as volunteers. As I too was considered a resident of Natal, I thought I must do my bit in the war. With the community's permission, therefore, I made an offer to the increase the prestige of the Indian Government to raise a Stretcher-

and sent my family to Phoenix in Natal where my co-workers had settled and from where Indian Opinion was published. I did not close the office as I knew I would not be away for long.

I joined the army with a small corps of twenty or twenty-five men. Most of the provinces of India were represented even on this small body of men. The corps was on active service for a month. I have always been thankful to God for the work which then fell to our lot. We found that the wounded Zulus would have been left uncared for, unless we had attended to them. No Europeans would help to dress their wounds. Dr. Savage, who was in charge of the ambulance, was himself a very humane person. It was no part of our duty to nurse the wounded after we had taken them to the hospital. But we had joined the war with a desire to do all we could, no matter whether it did or did not fall within the scope of our work. The good Doctor told us that he could not induce Europeans to nurse the Zulus, that it was beyond his power to compel them and that he would feel obliged if we undertook this mission of mercy. We were only too glad to do this. We had to cleanse the wounds of several Zulus which had not been attended to for as many as five or six days and were therefore stinking horribly. We liked the work.

their gestures and the expression of their eyes they seemed to feel as if God had sent us to their succor.

The work for which we had enlisted was fairly heavy, for sometimes during the month we had to perform a march of as many as forty miles a day.

The Corps was disbanded in a month. Its work was mentioned in despatches. Each member of the Corps was awarded the medal especially struck for the occasion. The Governor wrote a letter of thanks. The three sergeants of the Corps were Gujaratis, Shri Umiashankar Manchharam Shelat, Surendra Bapubhai Medh, and Harishankar Ishvar Joshi. All the three had a fine physique and worked very hard. I cannot just now recall the names of the other Indians, but I well remember that one of these was a Pathan, who used to express his astonishment on finding us carrying as large a load as, and marching abreast of, himself.

While I was working with the Corps, two ideas which had long been floating in my mind became firmly fixed. First, an aspirant after a life exclusively devoted to service must lead a life of celibacy. Secondly, he must accept poverty as a constant companion through life. He may not take up any occupation which would prevent him or make him shrink from undertaking the lowliest of duties or largest risks.

Letters and telegrams, asking me to proceed to the Transvaal at once, had poured in, even while I was serving with the Corps. On return from the war, therefore, I just met the friends at Phoenix and at once reached Johannesburg. There I read the draft Ordinance referred to above. I took the

The Zulus could not talk to us, but from Transvaal Government Gazette Extraordinary of August 22, 1906 in which the Ordinance was published, home from the office. I went up a hill near the house in the company of a friend and began to translate the draft Ordinance into Gujarati for Indian Opinion. I shuddered as I read the sections of the Ordinance one after another. I saw nothing in it except hatred of Indians. It seemed to me that if the Ordinance was passed and the Indians meekly accepted it, that would spell absolute ruins for the Indians in South Africa. I clearly saw that this was a question of life and death for them. I further saw that even in the case of memorials and representations proving fruitless, the community must not sit with folded hands. Better die than submit to such a law. But how were we to die? What should we dare and do so that there would be nothing before us except a choice of victory or death? An impenetrable wall was before me, as it were and I could not see my way through it. I must acquaint the reader with the details of the proposed measure, which shocked me so violently. Here is a brief summary of it.

> Every Indian, man, woman or child of eight years or upwards, entitled to reside in the Transvaal, must register his or her name with the Registrar of Asiatics and take out a certificate of registration.

> The applicants for registration must surrender their old permits to the Registrar, and state in their applications their name, residence, caste, age, etc. The registrar was to note down the important marks of identification upon the applicant's person, and take his finger and thumb impressions. Every Indian who failed thus to apply for registration before a

certain date was to forfeit his right of residence in the Transvaal. Failure to apply would be held to be an offence in law for which the defaulter could be fined, sent to prison or even deported within the discretion of the court. Parents must apply on behalf of their minor children and bring them to the Registrar in order to give their finger impressions, etc. In case of parents failing to discharge this responsibility laid upon them, the minor on attaining the age of sixteen years must discharge it himself, and if he defaulted, he made himself liable to the same punishments as could be awarded to his parents. The certificate of registration issued to an applicant must be produced before any police officer whenever and wherever he may be required to do so. Failure thus to produce the certificate would be held to be an offence for which the defaulter could be fined or sent to prison. Even a person walking on public thoroughfares could be required to produce his certificate. Police officers could enter private houses in order to inspect certificates. Indians entering the Transvaal from some place outside it must produce their certificates before the inspector on duty. Certificates must be produced on demand in courts which the holder attended on business, and in revenue offices which issued to him a trading or bicycle licence. That is to say, if an Indian wanted any Government office to do for him something within its competence, the officer could ask to see his certificates before granting his request. Refusal to produce the certificate or to supply such particulars or means of identification as may be prescribed by regulation would be also held to be an offence for which the person refusing could be fined or sent П to prison.

THE Indian-American Community: Siblings on Opposite Sides of the Globe

Americans and Indians have helped establish a bigger pool of knowledge to be utilized by both India and the United States. Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs) between American and Indian educational and research institutes have facilitated such transfers of technical and institutional knowledge. In fact, the first example of information exchange between educational institutes in the two countries was seen under the Kanpur Indo-American Program between 1962 and 1972 in which 9 American universities (California Institute of Technology, Carnegie Mellon University, Massachusetts Institute for Technology, University of California, Ohio State University, Princeton, Case Western Reserve and Purdue University) alongside the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) helped develop academic programs and research laboratories at IIT Kanpur. Ever since, many additional, organizations such as The Indus Entrepreneurs (TiE), a San Francisco based organization composed of businessmen with Indus roots, has advocated and allowed for financial information exchange between Indian American entrepreneurs and Indian entrepreneurs through workshops and conventions in both the United States and India1 (TiE, Mission of Tie Global Entrepreneurship). While developmental aid, entrepreneurial connections, and information exchange showcase some examples of economic exchange between Indian Americans and Indians, the largest source of economic exchange would be remittance, with approximately \$13 billion USD flowing annually from the United States to India (Migration Policy Institute, 2014)2 These various economic exchanges between the Indian American community and India showcase the deep-rooted connection of the Indian diaspora community in the United States with India.

Finally, in addition to such cultural and economic connections between the two countries, there also seems to be growing political connection of the Indian diaspora community to Indian politics. While the Government of India does not recognize dual citizenship and

Information exchanges between Indian thus prevents the diaspora community from directly participating in Indian politics. NRI schemes have allowed for the Indian diaspora community to achieve more rights in India in terms of holding non-agricultural property and other financial assets as well as quarantee unrestricted movement to and within India (MEA Report)3. Additionally, the Indian community in the United States has been active in Indian political advocacy through organizations, such as the Friends of the Bharatiya Janta Party and the Indian National Overseas Congress, which voice the concerns of the Indian diaspora community in the Indian political context (Migration Policy Institute, 2014)4. With the Indian American community holding a rather affluent position in American society alongside with their strong cultural, economic and political connection with India, the Indian diaspora community in the United States has the potential in helping address many of the issues faced by the Indian government and society alike.

> However, one of the major obstacles that has prevented the diaspora community from investing in Indian markets as well as contributing to programs such as Swachh Bharat, Smart Cities, Make in India and other economic development schemes of the government is the lack of knowledge held by the diaspora community about such opportunities. A 2013 study by the India Centre for Migration indicated the much of the diaspora community viewed the PIO and OCI schemes as a means to ease mobility to and within India and that the economic benefits provided by the 2 scheme were not being pursued by most PIO and OCI card holders (Verma, 2013)5. So, the issue arises not in the lack of economic incentives for PIO and OCI cardholders but rather in the lack of information, or even misinformation, about the rights they hold. Without accurate information available to the diaspora community in investing in both the Indian private market and the Government of India's development schemes, a lack of trust generates in the diaspora's confidence in investing in India. Therefore, it is important that the Government of India, through the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) gets

directly engage with the community and convey to Indian Americans, particularly POI and OCI cardholders, of the widerange of opportunities available to them to invest in India. MEA should engage more with the diaspora community by attending cultural events and discussing possible avenues of investment as well as holding more forums for increased dissemination of information. Through such direct connections, the Indian-American community can receive accurate information and learn about the opportunities available to them to invest in India. Furthermore, the Indian American community can use their affluent position in American society to promote investments in India by not only the diaspora community but other sectors of American society as well. This proactive method of engaging with the diaspora community would allow for the Indian-American community to develop a closer connection with India as they would see the Government making an increased effort to directly engage with them and thus increase the motivation of Indian-Americans to invest in India. Simply put, the community has the tools to help India in an impactful and beneficial way, they simply need to be shown how to utilize them and be motivated to do so.

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Report on International Workshop on India-Bangladesh Relations

Kolkata, 8-9, June, 2019

Antar Rashtriya Sahayog Parishad (ARSP) organised a two day international workshop on India-Bangladesh relations in Kolkata from 8-9 June, 2019 with the support of MAKAIAS, Kolkata and ICSSR. Several scholars from Bangladesh participated in this event. This conference intended to analyse the future direction of the bilateral India-Bangladesh relationship. The synergy between security forces of the two countries, the economic potential of India's North East and the crucial role the two countries can play in regional politics were the focus of the symposium.

Key Recommendations

Past decade has seen bilateral ties scaling new heights. This momentum needs to be maintained. With the presence of favourably disposed and dynamic political leadership in both countries, there was a unique opportunity to accelerate economic cooperation further. Both countries needed to

approach the relations with the sense of self assurance keeping the long term perspective in mind.

Security and Defense

- Need to expand intelligence cooperation with the focus on dealing with rising religious radicalism.
- Stricter monitoring and clamp down on human trafficking, illegal migration, trade in contraband and other border management issues.

 Expand defence sector cooperation with continued focus on capacity building through training courses. More frequent engagement for joint military exercises including Maritime exercises. India should consider supply of military hardware under concessional lines of credit (Loc)

 Joint operations against militants and establishment of a joint intelligence cell.

Economic operations

 Expedite connectivity infrastructure - railways & highways, expansion of waterways routes, more ICPs to facilitate border trade and bypass roads near border ICPs.

- Expand transit routes via Bangladesh to North Eastern Indian states.
- Focus on lowering of Non-Tariff Barriers (NTBs). Build more testing centres near border ICPs for phyto sanitary certification.
- Harmonising of standards of traded goods and greater cooperation between Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS) and Bangladesh Standards and Testing Institution (BSTI).
- On time project implementation needs to be according high priority.
- Efforts to promote greater Indian investments in Bangladesh. Readymade garments, higher education, tourism and power generations were identified as promising areas.

Other Areas

- Climate change issues. Special focus to be given to the Sundarban delta which is the largest Mangrove region of the world.
- Maritime connectivity through waterways
- Intensify BIMSTEC engagement and upgrade secretariat resources
- Need to expand people to people connectivity through easier access to people from Bangladesh.
- There are considerable civilization and cultural commonalties between the two countries. Both governments must support projects including joint literary and cultural festivals to promote greater awareness about each other.

REPORT ON INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON Forced Labour & Migration in Fiji

A three-member ARSP delegation comprising of Shri Narayan Kumar, Shri Gopal Arora and Shri Rakesh Pandey visited Fiji to participate in an 'International Conference on Forced Labour & Migration: Indentured & Pacific Labour Trades' from 15 to 17 July 2019.

The conference was organised by the Girmityas. Global Girmit Institute in collaboration with University of Fiji in Lautoka. Shri Narayan Kumar presented his paper on 'Forced Labour in Literature and Popular Culture'. Shri Rakesh Pandey spoke on 'गिरमिटिया देशों मे सांस्कृतिक एवं भाषाई विकास एवं वर्तमान संकट'.

Shri Gopal Arora made his presentation in the valedictory session on 'Descendents of Forced Labour Migrants-The Way Ahead'.

The chief guest at the inaugural session was the minister of education in the Government of Fiji Smt Rosy Akbar. The keynote address was delivered by the former governor general of New Zealand Sir Anand Satyanand, Indian High Commissioner to Fiji Her Excellency Smt Padmaja gave the concluding remarks during the valedictory session.

Smt. Rosy Akbar highlighted the contribution of the migrants from India brought to Fiji under indenture ship system and from Pacific islands under the black birding practice. Black birding involved kidnapping of Pacific Islanders and transporting them to work in plantations in countries like Fiji and Australia as forced labour. The first batch of indentured workers from India landed in Fiji in May 1879 on ship Leonidas. They came to be known as

Smt Akbar said that the descendants of these migrants have fully assimilated in the Fijian society and should not be considered as outsiders or guests. She was referring to the controversy over the use of term 'vulagi', meaning 'outsider' or 'guest', used by a politician from the Nationalist party in opposition.

"I certainly do not see myself as a 'vulagi' (visitor) in my own home, in my own country where my grandparents, my father were born and buried" she said.

In his keynote address Sir Anand Satyanand, who is himself a descendant of a girmitiya,

highlighted four key reasons for the necessity to organise such conferences : Respect of the Migrants of the past, Sharing knowledge between scholars, Change of viewpoint by Governments of the past and applying lessons learnt and the results. He said that we have the obligation to the new generations. We need to acknowledge that the Indian origin people despite the years

of advancement are still in struggling Farzana Gounder, circumstances. He also stressed on the need to pay attention on gender issues.

He quoted from the work of a renowned prominent author "Girmit history is in the danger of passing from the domain of reasoned discourse into the realm of heritage During the Fiji visit ARSP delegation studies, as a subject for veneration and reverence Girmityas are gone. We honour their memory, but we must steadfastly continue the search for the fundamental truth of their experience. We owe them at least that much".

During the conference three books were launched. The book "Fiji Ma" authored by Prof Subramani in Devnagri script was released by Member of Parliament Dr. Biman Prasad. Shri Rakesh Pandey editor, Pravasi Sansar presented his comments on the book.

On the concluding day Ro Teimumu Vuikaba Kepa, a Fijian chief and Member of Parliament, stressed on the need to work together for the common good. "It is because we have a common destiny and we must therefore sit-down, resolve our common need and do it for the common good" she said.

The Indian High Commissioner to Fiji Her Excellency Smt Padmaja participated in the proceedings on last day. During the roundtable session on language and culture she said that debate and discussion on vital issues should be encouraged as this helps in deciding the future course of action.

Later in the evening Smt. Padmaja inaugurated a Girmit Mela of Indian folk music and Cuisine.

More than 40 International and Fijian scholars and experts made their presentations in 10 Sessions during the three day conference. They have contributed immensely to making India the cultural leader of the world- vishva-guru. After ARSP took the initiative of connecting Indians abroad with the land of their origin, there have been continuous efforts to re-establish linkages of NRIs, PIOs, Roma and those who were taken abroad as indentured laborers. But those Indians - NRIs and PIOs who crossed the boundaries of India spreading its knowledge across the oceans and the Himalayas in the first millennium or before, are not much under the lens of researchers in India. One such PIO was the great scholar Kumarajiva of 4th-5th century.

Kumarayana, the father of Kumarajiva was a Kashmiri Brahmana. He became a monk and left Kashmir to disseminate Buddhism abroad. Travelling along the Silk Route, on his way he was stopped at a Kingdom Kucha. He was forced to leave the monk's robes and marry the princess because the king of Kucha found him the most suitable match for her, being brilliant, knowledgeable, devoted and belonging to an aristocratic family.

Kumarajiva is acknowledged as a luminous star among more than 250 known Indian acharyas who went to China to spread the Indian wisdom. He was taken as war booty by the Chinese but

appointed as Rajaguru. His parentage, vision, knowledge, mission, wisdom and legacy in the East Asian countries should be known to us. He had the blood of Indian father.

Kumarajiva, a philosopher and seer, had a long cherished mission-propagation of the true spirit of Buddhism. He broke political, geographical, cultural and linguistic barriers; traveled through barren lands and rivers, mountains and forbidding terrains to bequeath a casket of sacred sutras as the most authoritative presentations by translating them from Sanskrit into Chinese. He created pure, boundless and unthinkable versions of the sutras as an obeisance to the sacred voice so

Indians have always been great that one could bathe in the pure pond of recognized as the adventurers, traders, acharyas, and Dharma.

Kumarajiva is one of the three masters - Dharmaraksa, Kumarajiva and Hsüantsang who stand out by their preeminence virtue and for spreading the subtle philosophical systems of Buddhism. The history began with the two Sanskrit Acharyas - Dharmaraksha and Kashyapa Matanga who carried Sanskrit texts to China and began their translations. They are followed by a continuous flow of Indians scholars going to China.

The credit of full flowering Indian culture in China goes to Kumarajiva. He remains central to practical Buddhism in East Asia. He represents an international personality. As a son of a Kuchean mother he spoke a European language while as a son of a Kashmiri Brahmana he could he was proficient in Sanskrit. He could read and discuss in Sanskrit which was the medium of instruction also.

Kumarajiva traveled from Kucha upto Kashmir with his mother at a tender age. He studied Vedas at Kashgar which is called Kashi in modern Chinese political maps. When he went back his fame reached far and wide. The Chinese Emperor of Former Qin dynasty-Fu Jian sent 70,000 soldiers in AD 382 to capture him when he found that he was not successful in nudging the emperor of Kucha to send Kumarajiva. He was forced to stay in prison for seventeen years under harsh circumstances.

Finally he reached Changan, the then capital of China and undertook translation of a number of important and popular Sanskrit texts. Till date his works are used in most of Asia. In Japan 65,000 temples and monasteries out of total 75,000, are based on the philosophy of the texts translated and recreated by him. Devotees pay homage to him when they go to temples and chant sutras translated by him. In Japan he is popularly known as Kumaraju.

Till date Kumarajiva is famed in East Asian countries for his encyclopedic knowledge of Buddhism and Vedic learning, for fluency and proficiency in Sanskrit and Chinese languages and for excellence of translations couched in powerful and compelling language. His sensitivity to both the languages was remarkable. For his comprehension of the words of the Buddha, he is

recognized as the most prominent among around 250 great translators of B u d d h i s t scriptures, who were active from 2nd to 13th century.

Fifty-four texts that he translated in a distinctive style possessing a flowing smoothness, run into 6000-7000 fascicles. They reflect prioritization of conveying the meaning as opposed to precise literal rendering. Generations after generations acknowledge his brilliance. The impact of his works can still be felt in almost all the schools/sects of Mahayana Buddhism in East Asia.

Kumarajiva based himself upon the philosophy of Nagarjuna, one of the most renowned Buddhist teachers whose teachings represent the Mahayana doctrine. His dedication resulted in reverence for sutras like Saddharma-pundarika Sutra, Prajnaparamita and Vimalakrttinirdesha which are widely studied throughout East Asia and have a great impact on their cultural development. People adore him as a true disciple of the Buddha, a pure mirror, who never made any claim about his special insight. He never offered interpretations bearing shades of his personal bias or polemical judgments. He is compared to a lotus flower in the muddy swamp who was responsible for the great waves of Buddhist thought which flowed across China over a thousand years ago.

From the first Indians elected to the House of Commons in the 1890s to as many as three ministers at the cabinet table now: the Indian community has come a long way, reflecting its

growing influence as well as the way Britain is more accepting of nonwhites in positions of power. The appointments of Patel, Sharma and Sunak mean it will be the first time the UK prime minister's cabinet table will have three ministers from the 1.5 million-strong Indian community.

Prime Minister Boris Johnson appointed Priti Patel as the home secretary and Alok Sharma as the international development secretary. Rishi Sunak does not have cabinet rank but as the chief secretary to the treasury, will attend cabinet meetings. Priti Patel is English-born to Indian parents. In the EU referendum campaign she launched an appeal to "Save the British Curry" which argued communities and local government

that a post-Brexit immigration system would be fairer to those from outside the EU and ease a shortage of chefs for Indian restaurants in Britain. The 51year-old Conservative Party

MP, Alok Sharma, who was serving as employment minister has been promoted to a full-fledged cabinet post in the department for international development (DfID), where he will be in charge of the UK's aid budget and partnerships. Rishi Sunak, son-in-law of Infosys co-founder NR Narayana Murthy, has been appointed to Johnson's cabinet as the chief secretary to the treasury. Sunak was elected as the MP for Richmond in North Yorkshire in 2015 and re-elected in 2017. He was parliamentary private secretary at the department for business, energy and industrial strategy from June 2017 and parliamentary under-secretary of state at the ministry of housing, from January 9, 2018.

The appointments are also seen as the inevitable outcome of the Conservative party increasing its vote share from the Indian community

As part of a MoU signed with the Maharashtra government, UNSW will offer 20 PhD scholarships every year to highachieving students from the state universities to advance joint research and knowledge exchange. The university has seen a steady flow of enrolments from meritorious Indian students over the past few years, with several of them availing the Future of Change scholarships.

PIO-LED TEAM DEVELOPS **Early Version Vaccine** for Alzheimer's

Ateam led by an Indian-American scientist at the University of New Mexico (UNM) have made a k e y breakthrough in the drive to find a vaccine



cure for Alzheimer's Dr. Kiran Bhaskar disease, a malady that affects nearly 50 million people worldwide.

In a paper published last week in NPJ Vaccines, a team led by Dr Kiran Bhaskar, associate professor in UNM's Department of Molecular Genetics & Microbiology, reported it had engineered a vaccine using viruslike particles (VLPs, for short) that eliminated the "tau tangles" in mice that had been bred to develop symptoms like those affecting human Alzheimer's patients.

Normally a stabilizing structure inside of neurons, Tau is a protein that when it occurs in tangled formations in the brain of Alzheimer patients, disrupt the ability of neurons to communicate with one another in the brain.

Bhaskar and his team found that when the vaccine they have developed was given to Alzheimer-affected mice, they developed antibodies that cleared the tau protein from their brains - and the response lasted for months. MRI scans also showed that the vaccinated animals had less brain shrinkage, suggesting that the vaccine prevented neurons from dying.



फिजी के पहले गिरमिटिया

फिजी में गिरमिटिया लोगों को बुलाने का विचार सर आर्थर गॉर्डन का था, जो उन दिनों फिजी के गवर्नर थे। सन् 1879 में रियुनियन द्वीप से 31 मजदूर फ्रांस के द्वी प दूसरे कैलिडोनिया' लाये गये और वहां से ब्रिटिश लोग उन्हें फिजी ले आये। पह ये मजदूर अब कच्चे खिलाड़ी नहीं थे। वो कई वर्ष गिरमिटिया रूप में बिता चुके थे। उन्हें एग्रीमेण्ट की शर्तों का अन्दाजा हो गया


था। उन्होंने फिजी में काम करने से इंकार कर -फिजी द्वीप नजर भी आने लगा था। पर द्वीप के -'अनफिट' होते, उनको कम काम और कम पैसे दिया, यह कहकर कि यहां काम ज्यादा है। करीब आते ही जहाज में कुछ हलचल हुई। मिलते जब तक वो 'फिट' नहीं हो पाते। इस आखिर उन्हें वापस भेजना पड़ा। 1881 ई. में जहां द्वीप से बस चार मील दूर 'नसीलाई रीफ' द्वीप से भी भागने की कोशिश होती। दो दक्षिण फिर से 38 मजदूर इसी रास्ते लाये गये, और पत्थर से टकरा गया, और उसमें छेद हो गया। भारतीयों ने जब नृकुलाऊ द्वीप से विटी लेवू

लोग घुम-घुम कर थक गये थे तो वहीं जम गये। कुछ ने फिजी की महिलाओं से विवाह भी कर लिया। उनका वापस 'रियूनियन' से कभी रियूनियन नहीं हुआ।

फिजी में उन दिनों गन्ने की खेती ब्रिटिश सरकार ने शुरू की, पह वहां के आदिवासी काम करने को तैयार नहीं थे। फिर सोलोमन द्वीप-समृह (अब वनुआत्) से मजदूर लाये गये, पर वो भी भाग गये। आखिर सर गॉर्डन ने कलकत्ता की 'रिक्रूटमेण्ट एजेंसियों' से सम्पर्क किया।

कलकत्ता से 463 मजदूर लाये गये और यह सिलसिला ऐसा चला कि अगले 40 वर्षों में लगभग साठ हजार भारतीय मजदूर आ गये। उन दिनों फिजी पहुंचने में साधारण जहाज 73 दिन लेते, पर बाद में स्टीमर जहां एक महीने में पहुंचाने लगे। शुरूआती जहाजों में खासकर एक जहाज गिरमिटिया इतिहास में अविस्मरणीय है।

1884 ई. में जहाज 'सीरिया' कलकत्ता से कुल 479 मजदूरों को लेकर चला। जहां भारत से काफी तेज गति से बस 58 दिन के सफर में फिजी पहुंचने वाला था। यह एक उत्साहित मजदूरों का दल था, और उन्हें आखिर उस रात



उनमें भी कुछ लोग वापस लौट गये। पर कुछ जहां डूबने लगा। फिजी के गवर्नर आर्थर गॉर्डन द्वीप देखा, उन्हें लगा कि वही भारत है। वी

तक अलग हो गये।



पाकिस्तान में बंटवारें के बाद पहली बार खुला १,००० साल पुराना मंदिर

पाकिस्तान के सियालकोट में 1,000 साल पुराना मंदिर बंटवारे के बाद पहली बार 'पूजा' के लिए खोला गया। पाकिस्तान के अधिकारियों ने बताया कि स्थानीय लोगों की मांग के बाद इसे खोला गया है। दिवंगत लेखक राशिद नियाज के द्वारा लिखी गई 'हिस्ट्री ऑफ सियालकोट' के मुताबिक यह मंदिर 1,000 साल पुराना है और लाहौर से 100 किलोमीटर की दूरी पर शहर के धरोवाल क्षेत्र में है। इसे शवाला (शिवालय) तेज सिंह मंदिर के नाम से जाना जाता है और इसका निर्माण सरदार तेजा सिंह ने करवाया था।

कर दिया जाएगा। शवाला तेज सिंह मंदिर के 72 साल बाद खुलने से इलाके का हिन्दू समुदाय खुश है। पाकिस्तान में हिन्दू समुदाय सबसे बड़ा अल्पसंख्यक समुदाय है। आध्किारिक आंकड़ों के मुताबिक यहां करीब 75 लाख हिन्दू रहते हैं, लेकिन इस समुदाय का कहना है कि यहां 90 लाख से ज्यादा हिन्दू है। हिन्दू समुदाय की यह भी शिकायत है कि जबरन यहां हिन्दू महिलाओं का धर्मपरिवर्तन कराया जा रहा है तथा ऐसी अन्य कई हिन्दू मंदिर है जो तोड़फोड़ के कारण क्षतिग्रस्त हुये है। पाकिस्तान सरकार को इस संबंध में तत्काल कार्यवाही कर हिंदुओं के धर्मपरिर्वतन और हिन्दू मंदिरों के तोड़फोड़ को रोकने के लिये आवश्यक कार्यवाही करनी चाहिए।
