Europe's marginalised Roma community hit hard by Coronavirus

Europe's largest minority, the Roma people, are being particularly hard hit by the Coronavirus pandemic in many countries, because they face a combination of health risks, economic deprivation and increased stigmatization. Roma neighbourhoods in Bulgaria and Slovakia have been cordoned off amid fears of the virus spreading. Police checkpoints were introduced outside two large neighbourhoods in Sofia, and people were only allowed to leave the area if they could show a work contract or prove another urgent reason for doing so.

It is clear that Corona Virus heightens existing inequalities. Some of the most marginalized people in the UK are Gypsy, Roma Travellers, yet they are often left out of research and outreach programmes. The true impacts of COVID-19 on Roma, Gypsy and Travellers could remain dangerously hidden. There are increased challenges for those living in Caravans during the pandemic, including accessibility of gas bottles, sewerage and obtaining fresh water. Roma and Gypsy living on unauthorised sites experience the most significant problems, especially in accessing suitable sanitation and waste disposal.

Council of Europe Recommended, Schools should include Roma and Traveller history in teaching curricula

The Council of Europe's Committee of Ministers adopted a Recommendation that for the first time ever calls on its 47 member states to include the history of Roma and/or Travellers in school curricula and teaching materials. The Recommendation emphasizes the importance of teaching the Holocaust, as perpetrated by the Nazi regime and its allies as well as other acts committed against Roma and Travellers across Europe. It calls on governments to integrate activities related to the remembrance of the Roma Holocaust into formal and non-formal education, in connection with the European Roma Holocaust Memorial Day (2 August) or with a date more adapted to the historical context of the country concerned, for example local anniversaries connected with the imprisonment or deportation of Roma to concentration camps.

Europe's Roma people 'left behind' during Coronavirus pandemic

The European Commission is set to release a new Roma strategy in October this year, but there are no plans to make it a binding directive to the European Union States. "The strategy will better reflect the diversity among Roma, including by paying more attention to fighting multiple discrimination of Roma women, youth, LGTBI people, mobile citizens, migrants or stateless Roma," Helena Dalli, European Commissioner for Equality stated. Romeo Franz, a Member of European Parliament of Romani descent, says it is not enough. He has submitted his own proposal urging Brussels to create binding rules and a supervising mechanism.

Romani Cultural and Arts Company (RCAC), working closely with Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities in Wales, has sent a letter to First Minister Mark Drakeford and warned that a second wave of Corona Virus would make the community even more isolated and marginalised. In his letter, RCAC's director Isaac Blake said that the pandemic "can only exacerbate the obstacles that Romani and Traveller communities face in accessing hospitals and doctors' surgeries".

I'm a Romany Gypsy – why is racism against us still acceptable?

I grew up facing prejudice against Roma, Gypsies and Travellers. Now the Conservative government and media are still failing us. Growing up in a small town in Lancashire, I was surrounded by others who looked and sounded like me. It was a three-bedroomed, semi-detached, 2.4 children sort of working-class normality. Except my family are Romany Gypsies. I remember from a very young age being acutely aware of my difference from the other children in my school. My dad had instilled in us that it was important to be cautious when it came to divulging our ethnicity. Having suffered many instances of poor treatment due to his race while growing up, he was trying to protect us.

Europe's Roma Already Faced Discrimination: the Pandemic Made It Worse

Roma people in a Bulgarian town are barred from leaving their neighborhood. Officials cite a medical risk, but residents and advocates say it's yet another form of bigotry. In Romania, Serbia, Slovakia, the Netherlands and North Macedonia, there have been 15 incidents of police violence against Roma since Europe's lockdowns began, including against young children, according to research shared with The New York Times by the European Roma Rights Center, a Brussels-based watchdog. The deputy prime minister of Bulgaria, KrasimirKarakachanov, called them "unsocialized gypsies," a term that critics said echoed the Nazi term "asocial gypsies."
